

WE HAD A GRAND OLD TIME!

They spilled out onto the sunlit sidewalk and man were they buzzing! Perfect strangers chattering to one another, "did you see . . ." "it was over there . . ." "I couldn't believe . . ." Such phrases were heard up and down 4th street. No, the Packers had not advanced to the NFC title game. These were the 550 attendees of "A Grand Old Time", a free event presented by the Marathon County Historical Society at the Grand Theater on October 9th as part of Wausau's centennial celebration.

Massive kudos to those who made this free event, which attracted people of all ages, so successful. Whose brainchild was this silent film with musical illustration? Why, of course, that person was MCHS Board member and coowner of Janke Bookstore - Jane Janke Johnson. Jane conceived the initial event idea, promoted it and presented it with her accustomed panache. Other welcomers in period costume were Joel Gardner, Connie Heidemann, Dana Macalalad, and Kelly Zagrzebski. Alison Coady, our smiling front desk manager at the Woodson History Center, used her considerable graphic arts skills to create the promotional poster.

The "Three Bobs", stalwart MCHS volunteers, combined their knowledge of film, film repositories, Wausau history, and digitization technology to assemble the montage. Bob Wylie, author of "Wings North", obtained digitized aviation footage from the EAA. Bob Becker, who donated the Becker Communications archive to the MCHS, digitized footage of the old courthouse and dispensed his encyclopedic knowledge of Wausau history. Bob Sanders, retired forensic photographer, lent his digitization technical expertise. Quarterbacking the production process was MCHS archivist and historian, Ben Clark, who earned his B.A. in history from UW-Stevens Point and his M.A. in history with a certification in Public History from UW-Eau Claire.

The inanimate star of the show was the 1926 Wonder Kilgen Organ, which was a mainstay at the opera house that later became the Grand Theater. Some years ago John Webb (Ben Clark's grandfather) and Dan Larson restored the organ to its former glory. Musician extraordinaire, Dan Larson, composed a theme and selected published music to illustrate the silent film. Dan, costumed in the most stylish attire, accompanied the film for an hour and 15 minutes. His rendition of cleverly selected pieces gave humor and poignancy. Petula Clark's (no relation to Ben Clark that I know of) "Downtown" accompanied scenes of Wausau. Footage of the demolition of the old courthouse (yes, people remain angry about that!) was shown while "Breaking Up is Hard to Do" and "I Fall to Pieces" played.

And so the crowd spilled out buzzing. Will we see this recording on YouTube? Will Dan play a reprise? Will Ben and the Three Bobs create new historical film magic? We'll see. In the meantime, we at MCHS appreciate your continued support that makes fun, exciting events like this happen.

CELEBRATING 70 YEARS OF HISTORY

While we acknowledged 150 years of Wausau being a city, the Marathon County Historical Society also took notice of its seventy years of existence in 2022.

The need for a county historical society grew out of a meeting of the Wausau Altrusa Club in early 1952. The idea was greeted with great eagerness that the club named a committee of Dorothea Krause, Marjorie Bump and Helen Ohm to start the process of organizing an historical society.

This group soon called for a public meeting on January 31, 1952 to further the formation of the county historical society. Thirty people attended and a committee of Mrs. J. W Coates, David Biebrauer, and Nellie Nutter and the Altrusa committee: Dorothea Krause, Marjorie Bump, and Helen Ohm. The committee was already starting to acquire photographs and interesting historical items.

Sensing this new community enthusiasm, the "Historical Society for Marathon County Committee" invited all residents of Marathon County to an organizational meeting on March 18, 1952 at the Public Service auditorium. At this meeting D.C. Everest was elected president, Charles Manson vice president, Dorothea Krause second – vice president. The 20 people who gathered discussed dues, where and when to meet, and how to proceed with securing a county museum.

An editorial in the Wausau Daily Record-Herald stated that the newly formed historical society "promises to fill a cultural void in the Wausau area."

The Historical Society received the charter from the State Historical Society in June 1952, as well as their Articles of Incorporation from the State of Wisconsin.

They soon started to collect artifacts for a possible museum, gather documents on the history of Marathon County, and to assemble photographs of the county.

One year later, on October 28, 1953 at a dinner meeting of the Society at Zion Lutheran Church Hall, Mrs. Leigh Woodson, daughter of Cyrus and Alice Yawkey, offered the use of her parent's house at 403 McIndoe Street for use as an historical museum. After acknowledging the gift of the house as the new home of the historical society, D.C Everest president of the society, expressed hope that the Marathon County Historical Society "will become the most outstanding local historical society in the state."

The years 1952 and 1953 set the foundation for the Historical Society and established what would be an outstanding presence in Wausau and Marathon County for the next seventy years.

Having a mother with incredible sewing and needlework talents was a definite plus for little Mary Jane Felden (now Grabowski). After receiving a new doll for Christmas in the mid-1950s, Mary Jane's mother, Theo Felden, knitted nearly a dozen outfits for her. Two of these outfits are shown here - a ski outfit and a skating costume. The ski outfit includes pants, a sweater and a cap, along with wood skis and ski poles. Tiny red buttons decorate the sweater. The skating costume includes a dress and panties, a cap, mittens and a pair of skates. White cashmere yarn trims and decorates the pieces.





We were excited when Mary Jane donated her childhood doll and clothes to the historical society. We also received many stylish outfits sewn by her mother, an assortment of fashion accessories, and a wood wardrobe made by her father, Oscar. Several weeks later Mary Jane contacted us after finding the knitting pattern books her mother used when making the outfits. The "Mary's Dollies" title on the pattern books reflect the doll and pattern designer, Mary Hoyer. We were able to match almost all of the outfits to patterns in the books!

The doll clothes alone would have been a great addition to our artifact collection, but also receiving the original patterns was a bonus. Having these "extras" that relate to artifacts, as well as knowing the story behind the original owner/maker/user, lets us tell a more complete and interesting story when the items are displayed.

Thank you, Mary Jane, for sharing a small part of your childhood with us.


